One of the lovely things of living in a new home, where you only put your pictures up in the darker, winter months, is seeing them for the first time in the summer sunlight as they catch the sun and come to life in wonderful new ways. I find it quite captivating to look at something and to be drawn into

it a fresh.

Interestingly, recently St Dubricius church has been hosting their local Primary Schools art exhibition, where someone has been teaching them the artistic skills to paint erupting waves on the sea. To see a montage of the same image created through 20+ different lens was also powerful.

It has made me think about how much I often take all the beauty around me for granted; how easily it is to race though each day without really enjoying the views and appreciating the people around me.

If you are anything like me, it isn't easy to slow down, is it? To properly slow down on the outside (rushing and doing less) but also on the inside (finding a bit of stillness within).

There is a very interesting book called the "Three Mile an Hour God". Its premise is that we typically walk at three miles an hour. But that this can also translate into a spiritual speed too. A speed in which we can comfortably "walk", and keep in step with God, and really notice what is going on around about us.

Jesus seems to talk a lot about walking – but in fairness he probably did quite a lot of it. And as he walked, he seemed to notice so many things going on around him. He spotted new disciples; saw those who needed his help and healing; he even talked about easy and difficult paths; and of course he seemed to find his Father, God, speaking to him and guiding him. I think it would be cool to be a bit more like Jesus.



It is a curious fact that seafarers are one of the most important, and yet invisible, people groups in our society. We depend on them to bring us more than 90% of the world's goods and fuels, yet we rarely even remember their existence.



stages up to 40 daily races for around 500 boats and is the largest sailing regatta of its kind in the world. As a sea faring nation it comes as no surprise that sailors have their own saint. If you enjoy sailing, or simply messing about in boats, you'll have heard of St Elmo's Fire. It is the light that is sometimes seen on mastheads of boats after storms at sea.

St Elmo is another name for St Erasmus, a fourth century Syrian bishop who was not afraid of violent storms. Legend has it that one day when Erasmus was preaching outside, a thunderbolt hit the ground right beside him. That might have distracted many modern bishops, but not Erasmus – he just kept on preaching. His courage won him the respect of sailors, who also had to brave the elements of nature in their daily work. He died about 300AD

But when Erasmus was made the patron saint of sailors, it led to a curious confusion. His emblem became the windlass, a kind of hoist used by many sailors at sea. So far so good, but many medieval Christians, seeing the windlass emblem, assumed it was some sort of torture instrument. They knew that Erasmus had died in the persecution of Diocletian, and so concluded that a windlass had been used to hoist out his intestines (which it hadn't).

But no matter – Erasmus was not only adopted sailors but also by those suffering with stomach ache!

Weekly Church attendance up five per cent in third year of consecutive growth

Average weekly attendance at Church of England services rose by almost five per cent in 2023 - the third year of consecutive growth, preliminary figures show.

Meanwhile weekly attendance by children was up by almost six per cent last year, according to an early snapshot of the annual Statistics for Mission findings.

While total attendance is still below 2019 levels, the analysis suggests in-person attendance is drawing closer to the pre-pandemic trend.

In 2021 all-age Sunday attendance was 22.3 per cent below the projected pre-pandemic trend, but the new figures reveal that the gap had narrowed to 6.7 per cent last year.

All-age weekly attendance rose to within 8.3 per cent of the trend last year, compared with 24.1 per cent in 2021.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, said "This is very welcome news and I hope it encourages churches across the country

Ukraine: "goodness will triumph"

Church leaders in Ukraine have urged their citizens not to lose heart in face of the renewed Russian air and land assaults and the delayed arrival of fresh Western military aid.

The Primate of Ukraine's independent Orthodox Church (OCU), Metropolitan Epiphany (Dumenko) said that after years of war, every village has names of people who had "lain down their lives defending the Motherland" — though often such lists were only "etched in the hearts of the survivors."

Metropolitan Epiphany went on: "The enemy seeks to destroy us, leaving just barren ashes and scorching heat, and sometimes it may even seem that evil is winning. But its victory is only temporary – it can never be final, because goodness, light, and life will inevitably triumph."

The Primate urged that Ukrainians should learn from the example of their women, who were often the "first teachers of faith and virtue" by placing their hope in God, and "never despairing, even when conditions seem insurmountable."

The second in a series: Saints with holiday connections


St Gudwal the first Christian in Brittany?

If you would love to be in Brittany for your holiday this summer, then spare a thought for Gudwal, because this obscure 6th century Celtic abbot got there before you did. Indeed, Gudwal seems to have liked Brittany so much that he decided to stay on.

When you visit Brittany today, you will find Catholic churches everywhere. Not so in the sixth century – when only the extraordinary range of megalithic monuments dominated the landscape. There were (and still are) passage dolmens, stepped pyramids and stone circles. The best known site is Carnac, where remains of a dozen rows of huge standing stones run for over ten kilometres. Some of the megalithic ruins in the gulf of Morbihan date back to at least 3300 BC – that is 200 years older than Stonehenge.

Religion was certainly plentiful in Brittany, back then. But Gudwal was one of the earliest pioneers of Christianity in the region. He did a bit of 6th century 'church planting', too — when he decided to build a hermitage in the middle of all that paganism — probably at Locoal. In time, 188 monks came to join him, and they built a little monastery — probably at Guer.

But it was the man himself – his holiness and kindness – that drew people's attention more than the buildings. A man of deep spirituality and prayer, Gudwal willingly spent himself on helping the local people – it was said that he healed many by his prayers for them.

Letter from the Vicar of the fictional Rectory of St James the Least

My dear Nephew Darren

Your suggestion that every month at clergy meetings, someone should review a book of theology they have been reading, was bound to be greeted with uneasy resistance. It would mean that the majority would have to start opening books, rather than just occasionally dusting them. Possessing books does not necessarily imply that they are ever read.

I confess that I was once gloriously put down when I tried to impress one of our blue stockings by mentioning a new edition of a Dostoevsky novel. She replied: "I have never read Dostoevsky in translation." It only confirmed my suspicions that she had worked as a Russian spy in earlier years.

I was hugely impressed when, during the bitter cold of last winter, the Earl of Stowe, whose library would comfortably contain one of our cathedrals, told me he was slowly getting through its contents of tens of thousands of volumes. It was only some time later that I discovered he meant he threw the occasional one on the fire, when he was running low on wood.

No, my dear Darren, the only literary activities that will spark interest will be crosswords for the majority, or diocesan reports for the truly dedicated – with weighty tomes being used as door stops.
