#### John the Almsgiver

On January 23<sup>rd</sup> we celebrate the life of John the Almsgiver. I have often noticed, over years, of doing charity work, that people tend to be either givers or takers. John was definitely a giver – on a very grand scale.

Born into a wealthy family in Cyprus about 560 AD, John was married with children when disaster struck: both his wife and children all died. In his grief, John decided to go into the Church and was appointed Patriarch of Alexandria.

He astonished people with his generosity as he distributed thousands of pieces of gold from his own wealth to help the hospitals and monasteries. John founded new hospitals and introduced maternity wards, poorhouses, and hostels for strangers to the city. He forbid his officials to take any presents and sat in the open air beside his church on Wednesdays and Fridays, to make sure that his people had free access to him.

When the Persians sacked Jerusalem he helped the survivors with money, food, transport, clothes and paid to get captives back giving them their freedom. Whilst he gave for specific Christians purpose, his giving was to benefit all whatever need there was, whatever their creed.

As Patriarch he cared for the souls of his people in Alexandria, encouraging them in prayer and leading a holy life. He was, however, adamant that only true believers could take Holy Communion.

He died in 620, in Amathus on Cyprus, where he had been born and was canonised even though he had not been martyred. He is the patron of the Knights of Malta. Interestingly he is one of the very few Byzantine era saints to have been honoured in the West.

This Christmas why not make a gift to a charity of your choice and follow the example of John the Almsgiver.

Festive greetings one and all,

I wonder if you will be tucking into one of the billion scrummy mince pies consumed in the UK during this festive season? Well, it would be rude not too – especially warmed, with a dollop of thick cream or choice of tipple. Love them or hate them, they seem to be a quintessential part of our Christmas traditions.

Traditionally, they were made from 13 ingredients representing Jesus Christ and his 12 disciples; in addition to dried fruit, they originally included lamb or mutton, a nod to the shepherds, and spices, a nod to the magi. And, as I learnt recently, they were often served in an oblong shape, representing the manger, and sometimes included a pastry baby Jesus on top (if anyone is making one of these, could you make me one too?)!

I love that so many of our Christmas traditions point us to Jesus who is after all the reason we have Christmas time. Many years before mince pies and Jesus arrived on earth, a man called Isaiah, a prophet, shared some words that God had revealed to him: "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light, on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned". He was talking about Jesus — and he went on to say, "to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace".

How true Isaiah was. 700 years later Jesus, Light of the World, was born in a most dark situation. Jesus, God in human flesh, entered into the world he had created, and shone brightly indeed. And today he still shines; over this year I have become aware of the steady stream of people drawn into our church buildings sensing something of God's presence and wanting to experience more; it has been exciting to see, especially in these 'darker' times.

I would love to invite you to join us too as we are reminded of the story and gift of Jesus Christ, as we celebrate this Christmas expectant that God is still revealed to us all. And perhaps enjoy a few mince pies (minus the mutton & lamb).

And if I, or any of my colleagues, can help in any way, please be in touch – I do understand that this season isn't always an easy one for everyone.

With love to you all over this Christmas season and wishing you good health for a happy New Year.

#### **All About Christmas Trees**

As you decorate your tree this year here some facts about Christmas trees from The British Christmas Tree Growers Association (BCTGA).

Even before the time of Christ, evergreen trees were seen in winter as a symbol of fertility.

It was the 16<sup>th</sup> century monk, Martin Luther, who is credited with the idea of having lights on Christmas trees. He added candles to his tree, to look like stars in a forest.

Windsor Castle got its first Christmas tree in 1800, brought by Charlotte, wife of George III.

It was in 1835 that the term 'Christmas tree' was first used in English. It was in the 1840s, when Prince Albert, consort of Queen Victoria, began bringing trees inside, that led to their popularity throughout the UK.

It was Woolworths who first sold manufactured Christmas tree ornaments – back in 1880.

The tree in London's Trafalgar Square has been a gift from the city of Oslo, Norway since 1947.

The world's tallest Xmas tree, at 221ft high, was erected in a Washington shopping mall in 1950.

In a survey of the nation's favourite smells, real Christmas trees came eighth, just behind the sea, but ahead of perfume.

About five million real Christmas trees are sold in the UK each year.

Your typical Christmas tree of six to seven feet is between ten and 12 years old.





#### CHRISTmas - It's so much more than one day!

"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests." Luke 2:14

This message from the angels to the shepherds is the most poignant message of hope and peace, it goes beyond the gifts and festivities. It calls on all of us to focus on that gift of peace, challenging us to reflect on how we can live our lives in peace, and inviting us to embrace hope and harmony that Christ's birth made possible.

So how have we lost this simple message of Christmas? One commentator argues that we live in a culture of instant gratification, with a tendency towards external displays of success giving us an artificial sense of joy. Basically, we've lost our connection with the simple pleasures of the season and life.

I read recently an observation that resonates, how we fail to slow down at Christmas to reflect on the significance of Christ's birth and what it means, as we race through the season trying to keep up with this year's latest trend attempting to outdo one another with extravagant gifts and grandiose celebrations.

It's not about the supersized Sunday roast, with every trimming imaginable, or the Christmas tree floating on a sea of parcels or making sure your decorations comply with this year's latest trend. Christmas begins with Advent, a time for reflection, to consider the perpetual themes of hope, peace, joy, and love. So, this year I challenge you to reconnect with the season of Advent to take a few moments to re-evaluate your life and to consider what is actually important and what we want to achieve as we await Christ's birth.

Looking at the four themes the first being hope, which reflects Christ's coming, is celebrated during the first week of December and sets the tone for a period of anticipation and expectation. On a personal level it is a chance to reflect on our hopes for the future for ourselves, our

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family and those we love.

In week two we focus on peace, the peace that Christ brings into the world, centred on tranquillity and wholeness. Advent peace encourages us to let go of our anxieties, it encourages us to be peacemakers in our own lives, showing kindness, understanding, and forgiveness to others.

The third Sunday is known as Gaudete Sunday and is a celebration of joy the rejoicing in the anticipation of Jesus' arrival. Joy is central to Advent and perhaps we should give joy for the past year reflecting on what we have achieved, how we have dealt with the challenges along the way and cherishing those special moments as we make plans for the year to come.

The week of Christmas celebrates love, pivotal to Advent in remembering God's love for humanity in sending his Son. It reflects the excitement and gratitude for the coming of Jesus and we too, should take time to be grateful for what we have and the love we share.

I don't blame anyone for losing sight of what Christmas is truly about, with the continual bombardment of advertising and social media depicting the perfect Christmas, it's no wonder we have lost touch with what really matters. It's a sad reflection of society that many feel they have failed if they do not recreate the perfect festivities envisioned by the media, thus adding unnecessary stress at what should be a joyous time of year, when what really matters is to spend time with, or thinking of, those we love.

On a personal note, on Christmas morning as I place the baby Jesus at the heart of my nativity scene, I will reflect on the fact there is so much more to Christmas. After all, without Christ there is no CHRISTmas.

I wish you all a very happy Christmas and a peaceful 2026.

#### **Christmas Throughout the Christian World**

For nearly four weeks leading up to Christmas Christians recognise a period called Advent. It means 'coming'. It is a time of spiritual preparation. 'Coming' refers to Jesus' first coming as a baby, but it also looks forward to a day when Jesus is expected to return in triumph at his 'second coming' to establish perfect justice and a new order of peace.

Originally Christians marked Advent as a time when they refrained from excessive eating and drinking. Then Christmas Day reintroduced them to the joys of feasting. Christmas celebrations lasted for twelve days, with gifts exchanged as a climax at Epiphany (6 January). Today, however, Advent is more likely to be associated with accelerating festivity, with the days following Christmas something of an anti-climax until 'twelfth night', on which decorations are removed. Many Christians worldwide are trying to revive the spirit of Advent by setting aside time to pray and address global poverty.

Christmas Day is celebrated as the anniversary of Jesus' birth, although the actual date is not known. Most Christians celebrate it on 25<sup>th</sup> December. However, the Orthodox Church (the ancient churches in Eastern Europe and parts of Asia) follows a different calendar and celebrates on 7<sup>th</sup> January. Christians make a point of taking communion on Christmas Day. Many make it the first thing they do as the clock strikes midnight.

On 6<sup>th</sup> January the Christmas festival continues with a celebration of Epiphany, which means 'the appearance'. Christians remember the visit of wise men (magi) to Jesus, bringing gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. The Christmas tradition of exchanging gifts originally honoured these men, who were the first non-Jews (Gentiles) to worship Jesus. It forms a reminder that in Jesus God was giving Himself for the benefit of the entire world.



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Orthodox Christians use this day to recall the baptism of Jesus as a grown man. The significance of Jesus being baptised was that He identified Himself with human beings in all their needs. They mark the day by praying for God's blessing on rivers, wells and water sources.

Christmas has never been just an escapist festival for Christians. Those who treat it seriously recognise that not all the world is able to face the days with frivolity or joy. The day after Christmas, Boxing Day, was historically marked as the feast of St Stephen. He was the first man to be put to death rather than give up his belief that Jesus was God. And two days later a day remembering the Massacre of the Innocents recalls Herod's attempt to destroy Jesus by killing all male babies in Bethlehem. Although not so widely marked as Christmas Day, it gives Christians the opportunity to pray for children in today's world who suffer as a result of the actions of adults.

#### Where Did Christmas Cards Come From?

Christmas cards have a history which may surprise you, their origins lie firmly with the Post Office and railways. The very early 'Christmas cards' were in the form of a simple exchange of Christmas greetings in private letters. The earliest recorded greeting was written in England in 1534.

In 1611 a HUGE Christmas card made a one-off appearance. It measured 33 inches by 24 inches, and was given to King James I of England, also King James VI of Scotland. It's illustration was of a rose, and included four poems, a song, and a Christmas message for the king and his son.

Two hundred years later in 1843 Christmas cards as we know them today came into being. Sir Henry Cole, a senior civil servant who had helped launch the 'Public Record Office', now called the Post Office, was responsible for this. Sir Henry helped to introduce the Penny Post, as a direct result of building of the railways, which carried far more packages than a horse and cart making a postal service accessible to the masses not just the rich.

He wanted to encourage 'ordinary' people to use the new service and came up with the bright idea of a creating a simple card that people could send each other for Christmas. His friend, John Horsley, an artist, designed a three-panel card, two panels depicted people caring for the poor, and the middle panel showed a family enjoying a large Christmas dinner.

They printed about 1000 cards that first year. The cards sold for one shilling each and could be posted to friends and family for a Penny. There was an immediate, warm response from the public.

Printing methods improved, and by 1860 Christmas cards were produced in large quantities and the custom was rapidly gaining popularity. By the early 1900s, the custom had spread across Europe. The first cards usually included a Nativity scene, and in late Victorian times, robins and snow-scenes. They were mass produced from 1875, and in 1915 John C Hall and two of his brothers created Hallmark Cards, which today offers 2,000 different designs of Christmas card. Last year the Royal Mail estimated that it had delivered 150 million cards during the Christmas period.

#### **Nicholas Theologist to Father Christmas**

One person you are bound to run into this Christmas season is Father Christmas. Father Christmas wasn't always the red-suited, white-bearded star of the retail trade that he is today. He began life as Nicholas, born way back about AD260 in Patara, an important port on the southern coast of what is now Turkey. When his parents died and left him a fortune, Nicholas gave it away to the poor. He became a bishop of the nearby city of Myra, where he almost certainly suffered persecution and imprisonment at the hand of the Roman Emperor Diocletian. Nicholas was a serious theologian and a participant at the First Council of Nicaea, which formulated the Creed which we still say today. Venerated as a Saint, his day is celebrated on 6th December in Western Europe.

In the UK, Nicholas became the basis for Father Christmas, who emerged in Victorian times as a jolly-faced bearded character, dressed in green robes associated with nature. It was the Dutch and German settlers who took him to America and here Saint Nicholas received his final two great breaks into real stardom.

The first was when the Rev Clement C Moore, a New York Episcopal minister, wrote a fun poem for his children one Christmas. Today it is known by the first line: 'T'was the Night Before Christmas'. From this poem we discovered that St Nicholas is round, pink-cheeked with a white-bearded, and travels at night by sleigh pulled by reindeer entering houses via chimneys to fill stockings with toys and sweets.

Coca-Cola are responsible for him wearing a bright red, fur-trimmed coat and a large belt, unveiled in their 1931 advertising campaign.

Here's a thought, in order to get round all the children in the world on Christmas Eve, he will travel 221 million miles at an average speed of 1,279 miles a second, or 6,395 times the speed of sound. And you thought you were exhausted getting ready for Christmas!

the minds of first century Magi, but one Victorian scholar has offered an explanation as to the significance of their gifts. The Rev John Henry Hopkins, an American Episcopalian minister, in 1857 wrote his much-loved Christmas carol, 'We Three Kings of Orient Are'.

Gold, he said was a gift that would have been given to a king. Frankincense had traditionally been brought by priests as they worshipped God in the Temple, and Myrrh was a spice that the ancients used in preparing bodies for burial.

If this is true, then you could say that the Wise Men, in choosing their gifts for this infant, honoured Jesus with gold because He was King of the Jews, with frankincense because He was to be worshipped as divine, and with myrrh, because He would also become a sacrifice and die for His people.

We should remember that the Wise Men were the very first gentiles to worship Jesus, and what faith they had! They travelled for months over difficult terrain, never seeing any evidence of Jesus' kingship, His divinity or His sacrificial death. They worshipped Him through faith in God's promises about Him. It is Isaiah whom foresaw this response to Jesus: 'Nations will come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.' The Magi's faith saw far into the future.

If we compare them with the High Priest and religious leaders in Jerusalem whom the Magi met when they first arrived, these head priests knew all about the prophecies of the Messiah. Interestingly Jewish religious leaders did not feel compelled to travel to look for Him, and Bethlehem is only six miles down the road.

#### The Magi: Men of Faith and Devotion

Where did the Wise Men come from? From the East isn't exactly much to go on. The Magi had originally been a religious caste among the Persians. Their devotion to astrology, divination and the interpretation of dreams led to an extension in the meaning of the word, and by the first century the Magi, in Matthew's gospel, could have been astrologers from outside of Persia. Some scholars believe they may have come from what was then Arabia Felix, or as we know it today, Southern Arabia. It was the region where the Queen of Sheba lived, who would have visited Solomon and heard the prophecies about how one day a Messiah would be born to the Israelites and become their king.

The Magi asked Herod: 'Where is the One who has been born king of the Jews? We saw His star in the East and have come to worship Him.' A definite link that in southern Arabia the Queen of Sheba's story of how a Messiah would one day be sent to the Israelites had survived. This makes perfect sense that the ancient stories of a Messiah, linked to later astrological study had prompted these alert and God-fearing men to the realisation that something incredibly special was happening in Israel. They would have realised that after all these centuries, the King of the Jews, the Messiah, was about to be born.

To add weight to this theory is if you study any map of Palestine as it was during biblical times, you will find that the old Arabian caravan routes all entered Palestine 'from the East' or southern Arabia.

The story of the coming of the Magi grew in the telling, and by the 6<sup>th</sup> century they had acquired names: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. By medieval times they were considered to be kings. Whoever they were, we do know from Matthew that they brought three gifts to Jesus; gold, frankincense, and myrrh. We cannot know for sure what was in




